

Human Rights

Culture: The customs, arts, social institutions, and achievements of a particular nation, people, or other social group.

Dignity: The state or quality of being worthy of honor or respect.

Due Process: Due process, a course of legal proceedings according to rules and principles that have been established in a system of jurisprudence for the enforcement and protection of private rights.

Education: Education socializes children into society by teaching cultural values and norms. It equips them with the skills needed to become productive members of society.

Equality: The state of being equal, especially in status, rights, and opportunities.

Family: All the descendants of a common ancestor.

Food: Any nutritious substance that people or animals eat or drink or that plants absorb in order to maintain life and growth.

Freedom: The power or right to act, speak, or think as one wants without hindrance or restraint.

Happiness: The state of being happy.

Health Care: The organized provision of medical care to individuals or a community.

Justice: Just behavior or treatment

Liberty: The state of being free within society from oppressive restrictions imposed by authority on one's way of life, behavior, or political views.

Life: The condition that distinguishes animals and plants from inorganic matter, including the capacity for growth, reproduction, functional activity, and continual change preceding death.

Peace: Freedom from disturbance; tranquility

Privacy: The state of being free from public attention

Property: A thing or things belonging to someone; possessions collectively.

Protection: The action of protecting, or the state of being protected.

Religion: A particular system of faith and worship.

Reproduction: The production of offspring by a sexual or asexual process.

Safety: The condition of being protected from or unlikely to cause danger, risk, or injury.

Shelter: A shielded or safe condition; protection

Vote: A formal indication of a choice between two or more candidates or courses of action, expressed typically through a ballot or a show of hands or by voice.

Water: A colorless, transparent, odorless liquid that forms the seas, lakes, rivers, and rain and is the basis of the fluids of living organisms.

Work: A task or tasks to be undertaken; something a person or thing has to do.
